Governor Sununu and Senate Republicans have spent their time in Concord parroting gun lobby talking points instead of standing up for the safety of students and families. Meanwhile, other elected officials are working hard to advance common sense gun violence prevention measures. Here's how your State Senators and Representatives voted this session:

The very first bill **Governor Sununu** ever signed into law allows dangerous individuals to legally carry hidden, loaded weapons. **Senator Jeff Woodburn** (D-Whitefield) sided with police chiefs and other public safety advocates in opposition to this measure.
